The Irish Pastoral Centre (IPC) in Dorchester was founded in 1987 in response to the increase of Irish immigrants into the Greater Boston area. Today, a founder and current chaplain, Fr. Dan Finn, continues the IPC's mission of providing help to "the stranger among us." The Irish Pastoral Centre is a non-profit organization offering legal, social, educational, and spiritual support to immigrants of all ages and ethnic backgrounds. The center helps newcomers adjust to life

in their new country by providing a range of services. Older adults can find support through IPC's robust Senior Programming. From weekly wellness calls to Friday Fish and Chips Supper Club, the IPC is a hub of socialization. The Bumble Bee Knitting Club meets

Thursdays from 11am-1pm. All levels are welcome. During the week older adults are welcome to drop into a weekly coffee club in Brighton, Dorchester, West Roxbury or Weymouth. Attendees are encouraged to socialize with new and old friends over coffee, tea, and treats alongside music and educational presentations. On site, a SHINE (serving the health insurance needs of everyone) Counselor provides free health insurance counseling and assistance with Medicare. Separately, we were delighted to participate in the City of Boston Holiday Fare which featured knitwear from our Bumblebee Knitting Club as well as IPC resources.

Did You Work in the UK or Qualify for a "Top up" UK Pension—Irish Independent

Irish people who worked in the UK have been warned that they are running out of time to benefit from a "an insanely generous" concession to top up their pension from that country. More than 250,000 Irish people may be due to benefit from the pension top-up. Thousands of Irish people worked in Britain and paid the equivalent of our social security there, giving them access to a pension. Under transitional arrangements introduced after major changes to the UK state pension system in 2016, people can now "buy back" as many as 18 extra historical years of national insurance contributions. The deadline for applying and paying to avail of the scheme is April 5 next year. UK tax authority HMRC, is so overwhelmed it is taking months to process applications. Frank Buckley of USP Financial, a Co Offaly-based firm that specializes in helping returned immigrants secure their UK state pension. "People need to get applications approved by HMRC by April 5 so that they are in the queue." Once an application is in the queue before the deadline, the application will be processed and afforded a short extension once HMRC issues its verdict.

Opting for the special top-up allows people who worked in the UK to get a much higher state pension from Britain in addition to any pensions they are due to get. People are normally allowed to pay for a maximum of six historical years missing from their national insurance (NI) record there. "They are missing because they did not work in the UK in those years because they left the country." Major changes were introduced to the UK state pension in 2016, where people are now required to have 35 qualifying years on their NI record to reach the full standard rate of £221.20 per week. When it made the changes, the UK government introduced a concession allowing a wider window for paying historical years to encourage people to maximize their NI records. This means people can currently pay for a maximum of 18 historical years (2006/07 to 2023/24) missing from their NI record. After April 5, the voluntary contribution system reverts back to the maximum six historical years. Paying for 18 historical years would improve an existing UK state pension entitlement by £107.06 a week. It will be £111.45 after mid-April, with a pension rise of 4.1pc announced by the UK chancellor Rachel Reeves last month. Mr Buckley said the priority now is for people to at least submit an application to HMRC for voluntary contributions ahead of the deadline. People can find the application form, Form CF83, as the last two pages in the HMRC manual NI38 - which you can locate on gov.uk. People are under no obligation to pay for all 18 years. They can choose to pay for some, all or none of those additional years, as it a voluntary system.

recently.




Rock was born in

the North Strand in Dublin's inner city and grew up in Cabra. He died at St Vincent's University Hospital aged 88 last week,one of the

biggest stars of Ireland's popular showband scene as a member of the Miami Showband and later as a solo artist. He was also a former Eurovision contestant.

Fr Brian D'Arcy, who led the funeral mass and was a friend of Rock, joked that he would be "delighted to see a full house for his last gig". He described Rock as the "ultimate professional" who had given close to 70 years entertaining people and that his friends and family were "heartbroken" at his passing.

Hundreds of people gathered at the Church of the Most Precious Blood in Cabra including President Michael D Higgins's aide-de-camp, Capt Paul O'Donnell; Sinn Féin leader Mary Lou McDonald; broadcasters Joe Duffy, Ronan Collins and entertainer Adele King (Twink).

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DOOUNITY SPOTLIGHT: WIKE CAREY

When it comes to volunteering, Mike Carey is everywhere. No place is too cold, too far or too scary.

The 66-year-old Quincy man belongs to the Boston Irish Dippers who brave the winter waters of Boston for fundraisers to support the Irish Pastoral

Centre's health and

wellness programs. He visited a prisoner and a sick patient as far away as Maine.

Carey even bears a striking resemblance to Santa who recently visited the Irish Pastoral Centre and the Irish Cultural Centre. Likewise the Easter Bunny. "Any time anybody wants something done I try to help out," Carey said in a recent interview at the Irish Cultural Centre. Carey, the board president of the Irish Pastoral Centre who is a metal framing and sheet rock contractor, donated his labor to renovate the centre's offices in Dorchester. He also arranged for other workers to donate their skills for the project. "A lot of people donated a lot of time," Carey said.

Carey grew up in Rochfort Bridge, a small village in County Westmeath. He is the second youngest of eight children raised on a farm of sheep, cows and pigs. "It was a very simple childhood," Carey said, noting he knew everyone in the village.

Carey loved to play all kinds of sports, including football, hurling, rugby, swimming and boxing. "I think I felt comfortable playing sport," he said. School, by contrast, was more of a struggle, especially spelling. He grew up in the era of corporal punishment which included a pinch under the arm or the leather strap. One teacher used a half hurling stick. "That was the way it was," Carey said, noting he was not resentful. It was not until he was living in the United States as an adult that Carey learned he had a mild form of dyslexia.

Carey spent four years studying for the priesthood in Ireland before deciding it was not for him. "Celibacy was the problem," he said.

Carey came to the U.S. in 1980. He worked in construction and as a bartender in Fields



Corner. "They used to call it Fools Corner then," he said. "It was a tough place." He married in 1984 and he and his wife Brenda had three children who are now in their 30s. Brenda, a hairdresser, died of cancer in 2006. Carey, who married his wife Kathleen in 2018. appreciates all the people who helped him throughout his life, from the people who brought him to football games as a child to the immigrants who came before him and helped him in a new country. "It was very important to get that first job or the first positive experience," he said. "I kind of feel I'm paying back to all the small things that people did for me. I think sometimes when you're helping people you don't realize how important it is just the small things for people that don't know where they're going or what they're doing. It's nice to be sent in the right direction."

A COment to Wind Yourself

Self-Care Toolkit: Practical Strategies For Managing Expectations Over The Holidays

This month, the IPC's Wellness clinicians Danielle and Gina wanted to share some practical tools they've used to support clients struggling to prepare for the holidays. The holidays can be a wonderful time of the year to reflect and feel gratitude for another year of blessings. It can also herald a lot of anxiety and stress. The costs of the holidays (meals, socializing, the gifts etc.) can add to an already fraught, financial picture impacted by exorbitant grocery prices and an increased cost of living. Spending a concentrated period of time with family while struggling with mental health or substance use issues may increase our anxiety. For many others grief and loss in the last few years may make the holidays appear bleak and lonely. One of the consistent themes we hear about are the stresses related to the "expectations" of Christmas and the holidays. "I must make it the best one ever." "If I don't get them the right gift, they will be so upset". "I have to see all these people but all I want to do is crawl back in my bed". "I don't feel the way I should this year".

When it comes to managing expectations coming up to the holidays, we have some options to reduce our own anxiety and stress. Being able to have discussions with our loved ones before the holiday may go a long way to reduce unhelpful expectations, freeing everyone to enjoy the celebrations. In these conversations, re-evaluate your holiday traditions. If possible, host a family meeting, in person or on WhatsApp or Zoom, to discuss what would work best for everyone. Be honest about your need to spend less this year and encourage others to too. Perhaps establishing gift boundaries (Yankee Swop, cost limits \$10 or \$50 per person etc..). Maybe you can all agree on gift alternatives, like everyone providing gifts for children in the family but avoiding big gifts for all the adults. You could also explore bringing food items to share rather than relying on the same one or two people cooking for everyone. Sometimes even simplifying decorations and cutting down on dining out may also help our holiday wallets. Agree to meet people for drinks or coffee rather than an expensive party. Certainly, another way to reduce costs (and the impact on the environment) is perhaps rethink gift wrapping (reusable gift bags versus traditional wrapping paper). The purpose of the discussion is to establish that we all want to spend time with those

close to us but it does not have to be a lavish affair in order to enjoy it. Social media may heighten our need for a big splash but reminding ourselves that what we see others enjoying on Instagram and Facebook doesn't mean they are any happier or enjoy the holidays more than we are.

For those who have few options over the holidays; those who can't go home or are facing a holiday without a loved one lost to COVID, cancer or suicide, the holidays can be very daunting. It's important to find and use some tools that can help soothe and re-center us when our grief and sadness threaten to haunt us. Sometimes it can be as simple as taking a quick 5-minute walk, listening to our favorite music, talking to a trusted loved one or distracting ourselves with a book, TV show or a jigsaw puzzle. We wanted to remind readers of the quick, simple, effective strategies we shared earlier this year to re-center and ground ourselves. One of the most effective techniques to re-center is to focus on one's breathing; for example, put one hand on your abdomen and one on your chest. Make sure your abdomen is raising slightly on the inhalation and your mouth is open slightly on the

exhalation. Do this for at least one minute, preferably five. It's also very helpful to practice this regularly, even when you are not stressed, so it can become second nature. These tips might not erase all your anxiety and dread, but you may notice feeling more grounded and hopeful.

Immigration & Citizenship Support Services Program

What we do: The IPC's Immigration and Citizenship Program provides information and support to immigrants from Ireland and elsewhere including obtaining legal status, adjusting status, matters related to Green Card applications and renewals, visas, U.S. Citizenship eligibility, and applications for U.S. Citizenship. The IPC can also provide information about how to apply for Irish passports. Staff is available during normal business hours to help to answer questions related to these matters. Additionally, the IPC offers bi-monthly Legal Immigration Clinics where individuals can have a free and confidential phone conversation about their particular immigration situation with a volunteer immigration attorney.

- Do not answer any questions. You have the right to remain silent.

- Register your child's birth with your country's government and apply for a passport for your child
- Update school contacts

Getting Legal Help

- Only lawyers and accredited representatives can give you legal advice
- Notaries (notarios) are not authorized to give legal advice

Rights when driving

- Stay in the car and place your hands on steering wheel
- Drivers must provide name and address, but do not need to answer questions about immigration status
- In MA, immigration status is not required to get a driver's license!
- · Never present false documents

Rights if Immigration Comes to your Work

- · Right to remain silent
- Do not answer any questions or give officials any information about yourself
- · You have the right to not line up

Rights in Detention

- Right to remain silent
- Do not sign anything without consulting a legal representative
- Right to request release on bond.

RTÉ Toy Show Appeal raises over €5m— RTE

This year's RTÉ Toy Show Appeal has raised over €5 million with people at home and abroad donating in record numbers to help children and their families across the island of Ireland. Sharing the news, Late Late Toy Show host Patrick Kielty said: "We have so many projects across the island of Ireland that are going to benefit from this and with Christmas just around the corner, the difference this is going to make to kids and their families all across Ireland is huge. Thank you so much." The Show Appeal began in 2020, inspired by the story of Saoirse Ruane, who won the hearts of the nation. Saoirse sadly passed away in March of this year, but her enduring legacy continues with the annual appeal.



ESB offers free meals to Leitrim residents without power— RTE

Locals in Leitrim village were provided with free hot meals in their local pub as they wait for electricity lines to be fixed following Storm Darragh. ESB Networks has partnered with The Leitrim Inn to ensure families have some respite from their cold and dark homes. Adelene McDermott from The Leitrim Inn said: "They can sit down, stay warm, charge phones and us more than anybody knows exactly what this means because this time last year we ourselves were hit with the tornado after Strom Fergus, so we know what it's like to be without services." ESB Networks crews worked around the clock to restore power to an estimated 2,000 households.



Irish Language Film Scoops Seven Awards—RTE

Belfast rap trio Kneecap triumphed at last night's British Independent Film Awards, claiming the top honour along with six other gongs, for their critically acclaimed movie of the same name. The Irish-language film also scored three major accolades: Best British Independent Film, Best British Independent Best Debut Screenwriter for Rich Peppiatt, and Best Joint Lead Performance, awarded to members Liam Óg Ó Hannaidh, Naoise Ó Cairealláin, and JJ Ó Dochartaigh, during a ceremony in London's Roundhouse on Sunday evening. Speaking at the awards ceremony writer and director Rich Peppiatt said: "We're glad that the Best British Film isn't even British... it's Irish."



Mental health at the core of new community orchards

Two new community orchards have been developed and planted by young local people as part of the innovative 'Mind Your Melon' youth mental health project. The orchards, located at the St Vincent de Paul Centre and the new community garden in Rathmullan (pictured above) and with Lárchomhairle Paróiste Ghleanncholmcille in Glencolmcille, now form part of a series of community orchards planted over the last three years. The two orchards were planted with the active involvement of Transition Year (TY) students, support from local community and voluntary organisations and in collaboration with OURganic Gardens.

Kilpadder Famine Graveyard

For over 150 years, many residents of Kilpadder Famine Graveyard, located in County Cork, have rested in an unmarked field. This site, once home to poor families living in small, stone and mud cottages, became a burial place for those who died during the Great Famine of 1847. The land was part of the Frewen Estate, and when the potato crop failed, famine struck, leading to starvation and death. The people of Kilpadder were buried in famine pits, many in the clothes they died in, and the road from Kilpadder Cross to Colliers Quay became known as "Hell Street." Many of those who survived emigrated on coffin ships while others remained to contend with hunger and strife. Over time, nature reclaimed the land, though locals continued to honor the dead. Children were taught to bless themselves when passing the area as a mark of respect.

The bones of the ancestors in Kilpadder Famine Graveyard called out to be remembered and descendants of those who had emigrated to America answered the call. A query came from a man whose ancestors were buried in Kilpadder. Bostonian Bob Murphy, contacted Mary Nolan O'Brien, a local artist whose family had lived near the site for generations. On visiting the site, he expressed the wish that his ancestral graveyard be restored and made a place of reverence and respect. He joined forces with fellow Bostonian Jim Calvey and with the financial help of the Knights and Ladies of St. Finbarr Cork Club in New England restoration project was launched.

The graveyard, located on a steep hill, was handed over by a local farmer for the project, and the community worked together using the traditional *meitheal* method—neighbors helping neighbors. Under the careful guidance of an archaeologist, the site was restored and fenced. Mary, with her artistic vision, transformed the graveyard into a peaceful wildflower garden surrounded by native plants. Her husband, Joe, crafted a small wooden gate, and a commemorative stone was placed to honor the site.

While the work was in process, Father Finbarr Crowley, the local priest, was visiting friends in a parish in Boston, which happened to be the parish of Jim Calvey and Bob Murphy!

A special mass was planned for July 24, 2015, to mark the restoration's completion. Despite rainy weather, the mass was a deeply moving occasion that united the local community with those from across the sea. After the service, tea and homemade treats were served, allowing people to celebrate the reopening of the graveyard. A seat was placed in the garden for visitors to sit, listen to birdsong, and reflect on the past.

As the crowd began to leave, many looked back to view the little hillside graveyard now covered in wildflowers. All went home glad that after over 150 years of the graves of Kilpadder had finally been blessed and the bones of our ancestors were at last resting in sacred ground.

Cork football legend Inducted into Munster GAA Hall of Fame —Echo Live

Cork football legend Larry Tompkins has been inducted into the Munster GAA Hall of Fame. The All-Ireland winner with the Rebels in 1989 and 1990 is widely regarded as one of the great Cork players of all time. With unemployment rife in Ireland, Tompkins spent much of the early 1980s working in the United States where with players from Castlehaven, who eventually coaxed him into playing for the Haven, winning two Cork SFC medal and three Munster medals. He became involved in coaching while he was still in his heyday as a player. Tompkins collected two Celtic Crosses, six Munster medals, one National League, and three All-Stars.



RTE Sportsperson of the Year Award Announced

Paralympic gold medallist Katie-George Dunlevy has earned an RTÉ Sport Sportsperson of the Year award nomination, and her tandem para cycling partner Linda Kelly have also been nominated for the RTÉ Sport Team of the Year award. Dunlevy, whose father John is from Mountcharles, Co.County Donegal is Ireland's most successful female Paralympic athlete after taking home home gold and silver medals at the Paris 2024 Paralympic Games. Dunlevy and Kelly won a superb Paralympic Gold in the Women's Time Trial B road race. Dunlevy secured two Silver medals in the Individual Pursuit B (with pilot Eve McCrystal) and Road Race B (with pilot Linda Kelly).



Galway GAA 'game changer' facilities addition Announced—Galway Beo

St. James' GAA in Mervue, in Galway Cityhas made major progress on a dream development that's been over a decade in the making, after an agreement was reached with Galway City Council. The club is set to receive a new Astro Turf pitch, with construction on the project set to begin next spring. "This is a game changer for the club and the community of Galway city east. It will help clubs like St. James' GAA enhance and improve their training schedules all year round," Cllr Galway City East Shane Forde said. He hopes other clubs such as Renmore and East United FC could enjoy similar projects in the future and the pitch was championed by club members since as far back as 2012.



Dublin awaits as NFL announces 2025 Dates-RTE

The NFL will play a regular season game in Berlin for the first time in 2025, with Dublin still among a group of cities in the running to host games next year. NFL commissioner Roger Goodell suggested last month that Dublin could host one of the professional American football league's international games in 2025 as part of an effort to expand its global footprint. Last year NFL ownership voted to approve an increase in the slate of international games to eight from four beginning with the 2025 season. A commitment to playing two games at London's Tottenham Hotspur Stadium and one game in Madrid have already been announced.
